## Portland Marching Band Shares Lifelong Love of Music with Bahamian Students

Twirler Captain Patti Waitman-Ingebretsen grinned as she thought back to the Nassau show. "It was definitely a cross-cultural experience. I think everyone was surprised to see 50- and 60- and 70-year-olds in short skirts and purple sequins twirling up a storm to all these popular tunes. We may be a marching band, but that doesn't mean we play Sousa!"

The band capped its road trip the following day with its first-ever shipboard performance. An enthusiastic cruise crowd packed the Circuit Lounge aboard Royal Caribbean's *Monarch of the Seas*, rewarding the band with a standing ovation.

The Beat Goes On Marching Band is committed to delighting Northwest and National audiences while reliving the best parts of the marching band experiences that we fondly remember. Members range in age from 20's to 70's and hail primarily from the Portland metro area, though the Bahamas trip also included members from Washington, California, Ohio, and Texas. The group, which is renowned for its upbeat attitude, feel-good musical selections, and emphasis on audience interaction, has performed at numerous local venues including the Grace Hopper Celebration of Women in Computing, the world's largest international conference for technical women.
